

Environmental Justice

Any type of environmental, social, or economic effect has the potential to adversely impact low-income and minority populations more than the general population. The Final EIS considers effects on low-income and minority populations by the project alternatives. After considering the benefits and mitigation, there will be no disproportionately high and adverse impacts to low-income or minority populations as a result of any of the alternatives.

Impacts and benefits common to all alternatives include, but are not limited to:

- Increasing noise and dust and potentially disturbing hazardous materials during construction
- Relocating residences and businesses, including convenience stores
- Impacting mobility during construction
- Temporarily impacting transit services
- Creating new construction-related jobs
